HISTORY

Our building was built in 1922, and opened in 1926 at a cost of \$750,000. It was the tallest building in Los Angeles at the time.

The architect was Arthur E. Harvey, the same person who designed the El Capitan and several other prominent LA buildings.

It was first named the "Terminal Building," and two weeks later it was changed to the "Hollywood Storage Building" and was purchased by Bekins Van Lanes and Storage Company in 1939.

The Bekin brothers organized the first transcontinental move in 1895 from Sioux City to Los Angeles and became innovators in the moving and storage business. They later pioneered the concept of containerized storage.

The ghost on the 2nd floor has a very distinctive perfume smell, and the ghost on the 12th floor makes a lot of noise.



In 1926, the building was managed by Mrs Myda L. Shattuck - in an era when it was highly unusual to find a woman in a managerial position.



In the 1920's, the building was sometimes used as a speakeasy, and famous people attended parties on the 14th floor.



In 1930, 366 people were arrested on "moral charges" for participating in a wild party on the 14th floor.
